ESSENTIAL PAIN MANAGEMENT (EPM) WORKSHOPS

University of Jordan, Amman, JORDAN

October 31-November 2 2019

Executive Summary

- The Essential Pain Management (EPM) workshop has been developed:
 - o To improve knowledge about pain.
 - o To provide a simple framework for treating pain.
 - o To address pain management barriers.
- The Middle East and North African countries have not run an EPM program for healthcare professionals. This was recognised as an area of need by both the Pan Arab Federation of Societies of Anaesthesia (PAFSA) and the World Federation of Societies of Anaesthesiology (WFSA). Both organisations offered financial assistance to set up a series of workshops in this region.
- A working committee comprising of Dr Roger Goucke (Perth), Dr Patricia Yazbeck (Beirut), Dr Abdullah Kaki (Jeddah) and Dr Ramesh Menon (Doha) was convened.
- Contact was made with Prof AbdelKarim AlOweidi, chairman of the Dept of Anesthesia and Intensive Care at The University of Jordan and the President of Jordanian Society of Anesthesia, Intensive Care and Pain Management by the Pan Arab Federation and Professor Abdullah Kaki. Dr AlOweidi enthusiastically offered to set up and run the first EPM course at the University of Jordan.
- We ran 2 One day EPM Workshops at the University of Jordan in Amman on the 31st of October and the 2nd of November 2019. We successfully trained a total of 34 health workers over both workshops. 9 new Instructors were trained on 1st November.
- Recommendations:
 - o Continue further workshops in Amman and other parts of Jordan
 - o Improve pain assessment and ward protocols.
 - Address local barriers to pain relief

Background

The EPM Workshop was developed in 2010 to improve pain management worldwide. The workshop uses a management framework called RAT, standing for Recognize, Assess and Treat. This has been used very successfully to discuss common and also difficult pain management scenarios.

Jordan is a middle-income country in the Middle East with a population just under 10 million. Life expectancy at 74 years is comparable with many western nations. Healthcare is predominantly state sponsored (67% of hospital beds) and about 70% of Jordanians have health insurance, 80% of which is state insurance. While healthcare is modern and advanced - Jordan boasts one of the best Cancer treatment centres in the Middle East centred in Amman. There is very little Primary Health care. Personal communication from the department of Anaesthesia at the University confirmed the poor penetration of pain management training amongst all doctors and nurses (including anaesthesiologists).

We were very pleased that Professor Islam Massad, Dean of the School of Medicine was able to open the course with an overview of the importance of good pain management.

We had a brief discussion on the place EPM Lite could have in the University of Jordan undergraduate program.

Course Dates

We ran a one-day workshop on the Thursday 31st of September. On Friday 1 November, we conducted a half-day instructor workshop for 9 new Instructors. On 2nd November 2019 we supported a one-day workshop run entirely by the new Instructors.

34 participants over 2 one-day workshops 9 Instructors were trained on the 1st of November

All the participants were Anaesthesiologists, the majority were attached to the University Hospitals, including Anaesthesia Residents. There were no non-anaesthesia physicians or nurses.

Venue and Catering

The Venue: Lecture halls of the University of Jordan. These were very suitable with adequate seating, air-conditioning and audio-visual facilities. Catering was provided by the department of Anaesthesia and was more than adequate. There was an excellent Faculty dinner organised by Dr AlOweidi at a local Jordanian restaurant on the 31st of October.

Teaching Materials

The new beta version of the revised EPM Workshop slides were used. Around 15 course manuals were distributed. All participants received the EPM USB. All participants were encouraged to download the EPM Mobile Application. Feedback was received via the Delphi wall

Test Results

Pre and Post tests were conducted on each of the 2 days.

The results of the first workshop (D1) Pretest – Mean of 71%, median 72% (range 52-84%) (n=18) Post test results were unavailable

On the second one day workshop. Only 8 pre-test and 4 matched post test results were obtained. Mean pre-test test score was 74.5% and median 76% (range 52-92%)

The pre-test questions that attracted the lowest correct response were Q2C (33% on D1 and 11% on D2), 5c (28% on D1 and 11% on D2) and 5D (6%). It is possible that inadequate understanding of these specific questions has contributed to this. When the Post test scores were analysed in the 4 matched response sheets, a significant improvement in scores was noted, 72-82%, 52-94%, 84-92% and 80-90%

These results should be interpreted in the light of the fact that the response rate was very low.

The language issues to a certain extent were overcome by having two Arabic speaking instructors. The pre-post-tests might be better delivered in Arabic. To this end Dr Abdullah Kaki has nearly completed translating EPM into Arabic, we are planning to pilot this version soon.

Feedback

Feedback was anonymous and obtained via 3 open questions placed on the walls outside the venue. Listed verbatim below

Success and Relevance of Workshops

The workshops were moderately successful. We ran two one-day EPM Workshops and trained over 30 people but more importantly, generated 8 Instructors for the middle east region. All the participants were either anaesthesia trainees or practising anaesthetists. Their involvement was energetic and keen.

Barriers to Pain management and overcoming these barriers generated considerable discussion especially with regard to the logistics of Analgesia transport to peripheral sites. There was general agreement on the lack of pain education for nursing staff. The discussion around Nociplastic Pain and Placebo treatment received extended discussion.

Recommendations

- 1. Run periodic EPM Workshops at both the University Hospitals and other regional hospitals
- 2. Multidisciplinary involvement. Involvement of nursing and allied health.
- 3. Participate in discussions around the development of EPM in the region.
